

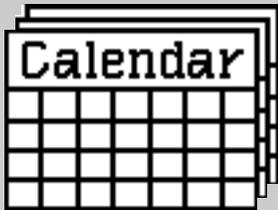



Demonstrating Responsible Dog Ownership

Amber had a clean run to pick up her 6th MX leg at Davis DTC. At NADAC/ASCA in Elite Veterans Standard she earned a two legs (two fourth places) in Elite Veterans Standard with fourth place. She also earned an Elite Veterans JWW leg for third place and an EAJ title. *Tyler* completed an NAC title in Novice Standard with a first place at NADAC/ASCA and a fourth leg the following day. At Mission Poodle Club (two days) *Tyler* scored 100 in Excellent A Standard for second place and a first leg and in Open JWW he scored 95 for a first leg. At Mission Poodle Club (two days) *Amber* earned her seventh and eighth MX legs in Excellent B Standard.

Luane Vidak:

Jiffy scored 97 points in Excellent A JWW for second place and a new AXJ title and scored 100 in Excellent B Standard.

Jennifer Slater:

In three recent NADAC/ASCA trials *Keeper* qualified four times in Elite Standard (first place, two seconds, and a third), three times in Elite Jumpers (two firsts and a second), and once in Elite Tunnelers (second place) to finish her Outstanding Elite Jumpers title. *Julia* qualified twice in Novice Jumpers with two seconds for her Novice Jumpers certificate. *Dutchess* gained two more Novice Standard legs with a first and second place and a Novice Tunnelers leg. *Jack Flash* qualified in Novice Jumpers and in Novice Gamblers for his NJC and NGC titles and four times in Novice Standard with three seconds, two thirds, and two [sic] fourths. At the Poodle Club trial *Dutchess* got her second leg in Excellent A Standard with a third place.



Variable Surface Tracking Match Breed Specific:

Shar Pei

Off in a new direction, Monterey Bay members held its first Variable Surface Tracking event. We met at the California State University Monterey Bay campus in Seaside on Saturday the 21st of September to plot the track. On Sunday, the track was laid early in the morning and allowed to age.

The campus is a very accommodating area to present this type of event. It has the three component parts: vegetation (grass, weeds, ice plant), non-vegetative surfaces (cement, asphalt, gravel, sand, mulch or hard pan) and numerous buildings in close proximity to the various ground covers.

Equipment for this type of event is almost nonexistent. A tiny construction flag marks the start of the track—the rest of the job is just keeping good track of the visual markers that abound—and marking them on the track layer's map. Club drivers use paved streets to get to their destinations with dog, handler, judges, and tracklayers.

There are no cross tracks put down, but plenty of passersby put in their own crosstracks as they move about campus. There are no alternate tracks as nothing is considered to be able to foul a VST. Two judges watch over the work of the dog and handler.

The tracks are between 600 and 800 yards in length with the track crossing at least three different surfaces. The non-vegetative area must make up 1/3 to 1/2 of the distance covered. The track must age from 3-5 hours. In order to pass, the dog must find all four of the required articles which are leather, plastic, fabric, and metal.

The gallery is allowed to follow behind and has excellent views of the entire track from start to finish. It's a spectator sport.

A last thank you is reserved for all the folks who responded to the request to help but were not able to attend because of the short notice and long-planned plans! Thanks for getting back to me.

At the present we are hoping that the AKC finds our match efforts agreeable and approves us to present VST tests. If all goes as hoped, we are intending to hold our 1st annual VST event on May 3-4, 2003 at the University. Hope you'll be interested in helping us out. We will be needing four tracklayers and some support staff. It's a very easy weekend—ask those that helped.

No other breed in the dog world looks quite like a Shar Pei. Its Chinese standards eloquently describe the breed's conformation—clamshell ears, butterfly nose, melon-shaped head, grandmotherly face, water-buffalo neck, horse's buttocks, and dragon's legs. The first Shar Pei exported from Hong Kong and bred in the United States had severe eye problems, necessitating repeated surgery. Successive breeding has diminished these conditions, but it has not reduced the very high incidence of skin problems. The Shar Pei can occasionally be aggressive. It is suited to people who are not allergic to dogs, and who are willing to shampoo their dogs frequently.

Breed History: A long-time resident of China's southern residence of Guangdong, the Shar Pei appears to be descended from mastiffs and spitz-type dogs. It is a fairly close relative of the Chow Chow. Driven almost to extinction by China's prohibition of dogs on the mainland, the breed was rescued by Margo Law, a Hong Kong breeder.
